Tips to Avoid Fraud

The Whitpain Township Police Department has seen a significant rise in identity fraud and check fraud in 2022. Even though these types of crimes are becoming more common there are preventive steps which can be taken to decrease the risk of being a victim. Here are 5 tips you can use to help prevent becoming a victim of fraud.

- 1. **Protect your documents** that have your personal information on them. Keep them in a secure place. Any documents that need to be discarded should be shredded.
- 2. **Monitor your bank statements** for all check activity. The Unites States Post Office has reported an increase in mail theft from their drive-up mailboxes. Thieves are stealing checks and are counterfeiting them. Make sure the checks that are cashed against your account are your checks. Also, make sure the check numbers are consistent with the checks you write.
- 3. **Never pay a bill or debt with a gift card.** An AARP Survey reported nearly 1 out of 3 adults said they or someone they know were called and asked to settle a debt, bill or other obligation over the phone with a gift card. A scammer may identify themself as an agent of a federal agency, a representative of a utility company or a relative in need of money due to a financial emergency. The scammer will create a sense of urgency to pay the debt and may even stay on the phone as you purchase the gift cards. Once the information from the gift card is sent to the scammer it is almost impossible to recover your money.
- 4. **Check your mail for any letter from the Pennsylvania Department of Labor & Industry.** Unemployment Fraud is at an all-time high. Many fraudulent claims are being made using someone else's information. If you receive a letter from the Department of Labor & Industry advising an unemployment claim has been opened in your name and you have not filed for unemployment benefits, contact the PA Fraud Hotline at 1-800-692-7469.
- 5. **Beware of online phishing.** Cybercriminals will attempt to obtain account and personal information by representing themselves as a legitimate bank, credit card company or some other financial institution. Look for misspellings in the name or email address. Never provide any personal information to anyone who attempts to solicit it online.
